#### NEWS OF THE LEAGUE TO BE NAMED LATER

Welcome once again to our all-too infrequent, and somewhat wimpy, League Newsletter. This will be the one that heralds the second YOO-HOO shower in as many years for the Mighty Quags, suggests the possibility of a format change for next year, issues a friendly reminder about League fees, nags League Owners to, for crying out loud, come up with a decent League name, and asks for suggestions as to a date for our League's Winter Meeting.

First, the Season Recap. Hearty congratulations to the De-Moore-Alizers, who rode Barry Bonds and Dave Justice to a very impressive third-place finish--quite a comeback from last season. Likewise to the Candy Stripers, whose strong finish snuck them past a couple of teams into fourth. Strong showings also were notched by the rejuvenated Hors D'irvs and Doctor's Dilemma; congrats to them as well. A somewhat begrudging pat on the butt to the Green Monsters, our expansion team, whom several owners felt had it far too easy. Finishing second, these guys were no '62 Mets. The Monsters' creator, Mr. K.C. "That <code>@#\$\*&</code> New Guy" Green, had best not rest on his laurels this winter: several teams will be gunning for him.

Dan's Fever, who were counting heavily on Cubs' hurlers Mike Bielecki, Les Lancaster, and Mitch Williams, got "Zimmerized." Owner Dan Myers on several occasions this summer tuned in to a Cubs' broadcast and found himself, to out it mildly, perplexed by the skipper's managerial manuevers. Seems that the steel plate in Zim's head malfunctioned on occasion, causing him to use said pitchers way too frequently. The fact that Dan didn't make it to Chicago carrying an axe with the Gerbil's name on it is simply a tribute to the fine security people who work at our nation's airports.

There were tough times this summer for the Doug Outs, and especially for Patrick Division and Karnold Nowledge, two teams who finished in the money last year, but won't see a dime this time around. The Nowledge spent some time in first, but finished fifth. Could be because their ERA for the last week and a half was almost six and a half. Or it could be because the evil Marvelle Wynne staged an unprovoked attack on the beloved Shawon Dunston in an early September batting case confrontation. Marvelle's explanation: "He was always messin' with my stuff." Unfortunately for Marvelle, Shawon was the last thing he hit all year, and if there's any justice, Marvelle and his stuff will move to San Diego, or wherever the equally evil Jack Clark winds up.

The season officially recapped, we move on to the somewhat painful subject of League Fees. The grid on the following page represents your League Office's attempt to reconcile the current financial statuses (statis) of our teams. Those of you who finished in the money last year and "let it ride" this year will find that amount reflected in "89 Credit." Others have already forwarded some or all of this year's charges or have made expenditures on the League's behalf. The bottom line is the Bottom Line. To those of you wno owe, we say the following: Pay Up.

Next, the League Office's 1990 All-Rotisserie Team, based on a highly "scientifical" statistical format evaluating players on their Rotisserie "value" (our eight categories of statis being the only bases of comparison). This formula actually was developed by Alex Patton, noted Rotisserie guru. The process assumes that, with \$260 to spend, the "average" Rotisserie batter is worth \$13 and the "average" pitcher worth about \$8.50. If we peg these salaries to the stats compiled by the about \$8.50. If we peg these salaries to the state complied by the "average" NL player, we can evaluate what a player was worth to his Rotisserie team over the course of the season, or to put in terms of dollars, what salary he "earned." Anyone who is really interested can obtain the full list of 1990 Rotisserie "Earnings" by requesting the same from the ever-compliant League Office. (Using this system, the League Office reminds you, it has compiled a couple of pretty good seasons.)

More nifty stats and such can be found on the following page. A feature entitled "The Hypothetical League" shows where our teams would have finished had no team made any roster moves following the Auction/Draft. (While this could be a particularily sore subject for some owners, it may nearten others.) These hypothetical standings prove once and for all which teams had the best drafts, and by comparing the hypothetical standings to the actual standings, we can see which team owners dealt themselves into contention, and which ones screwed their teams over through boneheaded moves.

Our next topic concerns next year's format. The League Office is recommending (and will not rest until) the adoption of Rotisserie Ultra, a variation on the regular Rotisserie rules whereby each team drafts a Reserve roster of up to 17 players following the regular auction/draft. Players can then be shuffled between the active and reserve rosters all season long, whether players are injured, sent to the minors, or just slumping. Any players could be picked for the Reserve roster, including minor leaguers, scrubs, college players, or AL stars who might get traded to the NL. Perhaps most important, there would be no need to enforce the dreaded "Freeze" rule, which was responsible for much controversy this season. What would Ultra mean to the average Rotisse-owner? An owner season. What would Ultra mean to the average Rotisse-owner? An owner could summarily nuke a pitcher who goes in the tank, simply by demoting him to reserve, without having a good reason! A team could make a 5-fortrade mid-season, without worrying about position eligibility! There would be a fairer means for distributing free agents. The mind absolutely reels with the possibilities. Ultra rules can be found in the official Rotisse-manual. Give some thought to the question whether our League is ready for Ultra.

We can discuss this question, and many others, at our League's Winter Meeting. Your League Office is currently soliciting suggestions as to the when and the where of this year's gala, the highlight of which will be, of course, the traditional YOO-HOO dousing, and the presentation of the coveted Cup With No Name and the Giant Checks. Last year's event won't soon be forgotten, least of all by the clean-up crew at Willie's Bar & Grill. Let's all do our part to make sure this one gets even uglier.

Finally, doggone it, it's time to come up with a League Name. This is getting ridiculous. When the League Office acquired the "StatsMaster" getting ridiculous. When the League Office acquired the "StatsMaster" software this spring, it was forced to enter something when prompted for the League Name. At a loss, the League Office, tellingly, postposed the ultimate decision by inputting the temporary moniker to which we now answer, The League To Be Named Later. The League Office is certain it is not alone in its gut feeling that that is just not good enough, especially in a League with so many good names. (The League Office has it on good authority that in many Rotisserie Leagues across the country, owners unimaginatively name their teams "Joe's Giants" or "Bart's Bears". At least we're not that bad.)
